SUBJECT: AUDIT OF POLICE RESOURCES

Dear Chris,

I refer to your letter dated 30 June 2011 where you requested our input into your submission to Mr Parsons, as part of the Audit into Police Resources, by the Hon Michael Gallacher, MLC, Minister for Police and Emergency Services.

TEPCP has addressed the audit items contained in your letter as follows:

where Police are and where they need to be.

Comment: The Local Area Command regional office is currently a 14 Denning Street, The Entrance. There is a proposal to move the LAC regional office to the new Police Station in Wyong. The LAC has a strength of 206 officers plus support staff. The Wyong LGA hotspot map 2010 - Percentage of incidents in the LGA located in the hotspot shows:

- The Entrance has the highest alcohol related Assaults (10% of 814 incidents)
- The Entrance has the highest alcohol related Assaults domestic violence related.(
 15% of 693 incidents)
- The Entrance has the highest alcohol related Assaults non-domestic violence related (6% of 998 incidents)
- The Entrance has the highest Break and enter dwelling (13% of 742 incidents)
- The Entrance has the second highest Break and enter non-dwelling (7% of 528 incidents)
- The Entrance is not a hot spot for graffiti. (497 incidents)
- The Entrance has the third highest Malicious damage to property (6% of 2,596 incidents)
- The Entrance is a Medium density hotspot for Motor vehicle theft (530 incidents)
- o The Entrance is not a hot spot for Robbery. (67 incidents)
- o The Entrance has the highest Steal from dwelling (9% of 474 incidents)
- o The Entrance is not a hot spot for Steal from person (128 incidents)
- The Entrance has the highest Steal from motor vehicle (9% of 1,190 incidents)

Of the twelve LAC crime statistics types - Wyong hot spots -The Entrance has six of the highest percentage of crime by incident type and clearly the highest percentage of crime in the LAC (9,257 incidents in total for 2010)

It is clear that the crime is in The Entrance and that is where the Police need to be. The Local Area Command also needs to be where the crime is and not relocated to Wyong.

The Wyong Shire Council's State of the Shire report tells us that beside the high rate of Domestic Violence in the Shire, Sexual Assault, Indecent Assault, Break and Enter to Dwellings, Motor Vehicle Theft, Stealing from a Motor Vehicle, Stealing from a Dwelling and Malicious Damage are all above the NSW average rate per 100,000 population. (NSW Bureau of Crime Statistics and Research 2009.)

how best to use the Police to protect and serve our community.

Comment: The biggest reported crime in The Entrance is Malicious damage to property. It is not stated but TEPCP draws the conclusion from results of research that a high percentage of the incidents are alcohol related. (LAC crime statistics)

It would appear that the best use of resources would be to:

- o Get out of their cars and actually inspect patrons in liquor premises to ensure the legal service of alcohol.
 - Feedback says:"The only problem we see is that we very seldom see police in Marine Parade or the car park and when we do they are in their vehicles and gone in a flash. Five years ago we would occasionally see them walking on the foot patrol through the area."
- Visible police presence at venues at closing time.
- Limit the number of retail liquor outlets (already 8 within a 2 mile radius in The Entrance Peninsula) – by more stringent conditions e.g. undertake impact study on the community with applications for liquor licences and/or outlets
- Program to reduce underage drinking and earlier closing times in hot problem areas such as hotels and clubs
- Educational program in schools aimed to discourage underage drinking and encourage responsible behaviour

the effectiveness of the current Local Area Command structure.

Comment: The Tuggerah LAC has one of the largest number of Police in the State. There may be better LAC boundaries that result in a more local police presence and faster responses in some areas.

The Tuggerah Lakes Local Area Command's (LAC) Crime Prevention Officer, Senior Constable Murray Alcock on 20 July, 2010 in a presentation on an "Update on Law and Order" to TEPCP advised:

"The size of the command presents special difficulties to the Police. The social problems of Wyong Shire, headed by high unemployment, low income families, and poor education outcomes was highlighted when Murray explained that Tuggerah Lakes LAC was number two in the State when it came to Domestic Violence. Domestic Violence is a very time consuming activity for Police and limits their ability to always respond to calls in a timely manner."

• Police numbers including alternative measures on strength.

Comment: There is a perception that The Entrance is unsafe. A recent survey of senior high school students by the Revitalise The Entrance group confirmed that they thought that The Entrance was unsafe and would prefer to go to Terrigal.

There is a clear need for a more obvious Police presence in The Entrance. Statistics show one side of the problem, but perceptions have a big impact on the tourist economy of The Entrance and people have to see Police and feel safe, especially during major events sponsored by the Town Centre Management.

There probably needs to be more office staff to support police officers.

where improvements can be made to the current allocation of police resources.

Comment: TEPCP is not in possession of sufficient facts s regard present allocation to comment, however there always seems to be a budget limit with regards to petrol and overtime which limits effective policing.

The reporting of Police numbers

Comment: While it is easy to get total strength the actual breakdown is harder to get. For example at The Entrance Police Station the actual number on duty after leave secondment, court duties, shifts so that the number actually on duty is known on a daily basis would be useful.
